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HISTORY OF THE FAIRFIELD COUNTY FAIR

1850

2025

Fairfield County was formed December 6, 1800 by proclamation of Governor St. Clair and was so named from the beauty of its fair fields. It contains many varieties of soil.

Lancaster, the county seat in 1790 contained about 100 wigwams and 500 people: It was called Tarhee or Cranetown by the Wyandotte Indians. In 1797 Ebenezer Zane opened the road known as "Zane's Trace". It passed through the site of Lancaster and in 1800 laid out the town and by way of compliment to the early settlers from Lancaster County, Pennsylvania, called it New Lancaster. The "New" was dropped in 1805. At the north edge of Lancaster is **MMount Pleasant** or **The Standing Stone**.

A fight here between the Indians, who had held the white girl, Forest Rose, as a captive, and her rescuers, Lewis Wetzel and Albert Maywood, was the foundation of a novel by Emerson Bennett issued in 1848 in which the heroine was "Forest Rose".

Careful investigation has shown that **The Fairfield County Agricultural Society** was first organized in 1850 with John Reber, President and John S. Brazee, Secretary.

The first **Fairfield County Fair** was held at Lancaster, Ohio, during the second week of October, 1851, in a field owned by the Society's president, John Reber. This location was west of North Columbus Street and south of the Reservoir. The first exhibition was quite successful and, consequently, John Reber as president was vested by the Board of Directors with the power to purchase a permanent Fairgrounds.

Mr. Reber purchased approximately fourteen acres lying at the foot of Mt. Pleasant on its western side and north of "Lundy's Lane" (now East Fair Avenue). The 1852 Fair was held on the new location.

As the purpose of the Society was the improvement of agriculture and domestic manufacture, cash premiums were offered for the best livestock, grain, vegetables and other products of the Home and Shops.

At first the buildings were rather crude with "Railpens" being used to confine the smaller farm animals. At that time horses were the principal means of power and transportation and so they received much attention and naturally horse barns and a "Trotting Park" (one-third mile race track) were constructed at an early date. Other buildings were erected from time to time and more land was purchased as needed.

By 1876 the Fairgrounds had expanded to 22 acres with the following buildings thereon: two amphitheaters, each 104 feet in length; a Floral Hall, Livestock Stalls, a Band Stand and other miscellaneous structures.

Premiums were paid for the highest yields per acre of the principal farm grains: corn, wheat, oats and barley.

Prizes were awarded for the Township that turned in the largest number of rat tails at Fair time.

In 1868 Purses for the fastest trotting horse, mare or gelding were first \$50.00, second \$25.00, third \$10.00. Starting in 1868 Velocipede (bicycle) and foot (walking) races were staged.

By 1880 the grounds had expanded to 36 acres and a new one-half mile race track was constructed with the contractor receiving 14½ cents per cubic yard for moving the dirt.

At that time six hundred shade trees were set out on the north part of the grounds, new cattle and sheep barns were built and much leveling and grading done.

The 1883 Fair marked the completion of a new amphitheatre 130 feet long and 50 feet high with the lower part used as a Floral Hall. The seating capacity was 1000 and was open only to the ladies and we are told that they were free from all annoyance and as comfortable as though they were in an opera house. The same year a large reception and dressing room for the ladies was erected on the north side of the race track. At that time the total amount offered for Races (both harness and running) was \$2,500.00 and in the harness races the winner of the race had to win three of the five heats in each race.

As soon as suitable Exhibit Halls were available, business firms put their merchandise on exhibit during the Fair. This practice proved very satisfactory both to the merchants and the Fair management.

In 1886, the shallow dug wells and cisterns, which had furnished the only water supply, were abandoned and city water piped over the grounds.

To accommodate the exhibitors of Power Machinery, a line shaft was constructed in 1888 and a Mr. Reed was employed to furnish power for the shaft with his portable steam engine. For this service for four days, Mr. Reed was to receive \$18.00, he to furnish the oil for the engine and line shaft, the Fair Board to furnish coal and water.

As the years went by more land was added to the grounds and all departments of the Fair were gradually expanded.

Taking note of the Fair success, the Railroads ran excursions to the Fair not only from points in Ohio, but from Indiana as well.

The summer of 1889 marked the drilling of a 10,000,000 cubic foot gas well on the grounds. At both the 1889 and 1890 Fairs, this gas was used to light the race track by standpipe flares, and both harness and running races were held at night. Fairfield County had the proud distinction of being the only place on earth where races by gas light were successfully carried on. The same time marked the use of the "Lake of Fire", gas being piped to the center of the lake and ignited as it bubbled up through the water from the perforated pipes.

1898 marked the introduction of mechanical rides for the entertainment of Fair patrons. For the sum of fifteen dollars John Gooding received the privilege of operating a Steam Driven "Merry-Go-Round".

Harness Races have always been a popular feature and at the present time, the track records are as follows:

For Pacers - "Toureg Seelster" 1:57.4-2023 For Trotters - "Workinitonbroadway" 2:00.3-2021 1904 and 1906 saw the construction of a large Dining Hall and Round Cattle Pavilion, in the order named.

After the 1908 Fair, two disastrous fires occurred. They consumed all the Race Horse Barns, which covered the entire High Street frontage of the Fairgrounds, the Art Hall and both of the Grandstands. 2016 the covered bridge collapsed due to high winds and old wooden grandstand was consumed by fire.

In 1909, a new wooden grandstand was built with a seating capacity of 500. The same year the Art Hall was constructed. In the next few years, this building grew to include the Agriculture and Horticulture Departments, school exhibits and considerable space for Commercial exhibits. The combined area covered by this one roof, totals 22,000 square feet. A combined Residence (for caretaker) and Fairground office, three new Race Horse Barns and Swine Barn were added during the period 1910 through 1916.

The breeding of fancy Poultry being quite popular at that time, a new 80' x 80' Poultry building was erected in 1922 to house an extensive Poultry exhibit.

Starting in 1914, the Fair Board sponsored an annual Boy's Corn Growing Contest. These were followed by Beef Cattle, Swine and Poultry projects, for the county boys and girls. This developed into regular participation in the annual Fair by the following named Junior Groups: Schools, 4-H Clubs, F.F.A., F.H.A., Boy and Girl Scouts, Campfire Girls, Farm Bureau Youth Councils and Grange Youth.

In 1927 the Wooden Grandstand was moved to the east end of the Race Track. A modern steel and concrete Grandstand, seating 2,600, was erected on the old site. The dedication of this Grandstand ushered in the first night Fair. General use of electric lights made this possible.

The first High School Band Parade was organized in 1940. Buildings added in more recent years, include the U shaped Brick Barn in 1938; the all steel Sheep Barn in 1949; Pioneer Cabin in 1953; Carroll, Ohio C & O Depot in 1966; the Joe Arnold Country Store and the Pole Horse Barn in 1969; the Roley Covered Bridge in 1972; the Administration Building in 1973; Weakley Brick School in 1976; the Livestock Pavilion in 1977; the Pole Beef Cattle Barn and the replica of a 1930 Gasoline Station in 1979; the Swine Show Barn in 1983; the Brison's Doctor Office in 1985; the Mount Zion United Brethren Church (Huddle Church); Show Arena in 1990; the AAA Multipurpose Building in 1999, the Ed Sands/Fairfield County Farm Bureau Building in 2008; the Ricketts Family Hall addition in 2013 and the #22 ladies and mens restroom was added in 2023.

The Fair management has through the years anticipated the needs of the community, both agriculturally and commercially.

The Fairfield County Fair during all the years of its existence has experienced foul weather and sunshine, depressions and boom years, has operated annually even through the unsettled conditions caused by five major wars. The Society has grown from operating in a pasture field with only borrowed money in the treasury to the unincumbered ownership of grounds containing 68 acres on which are 49 buildings and all necessary accessories for the use and convenience of the exhibitors and visitors, who annually attend this Exhibition.

The physical growth of this organization can be measured, but no one is competent to recount its contribution during the past 175 years to the development and improvement of the community and the nation.

Sixteen non-salaried Directors govern the non-profit Fairfield County Agricultural Society. The Fairfield County Fair is self-supporting and receives only minimum County and State Aid. Income beyond operating expenses pays for improvements, new construction, etc. The Fairgrounds is owned by the Fairfield County Agricultural Society.

MEMBERSHIP

Any person nineteen years of age or over and a resident of Fairfield County, Ohio, purchasing a membership ticket from the Secretary or Office Staff for \$35.00 may be a member of this society and entitled to vote by personally casting their vote October 25, 2025, between the hours 9:00 a.m.- 1:00 p.m., at the annual election of the Fairfield County Agricultural Society. Membership tickets will be on sale at the Administration Building, Fairgrounds, from the 1st of December of the previous year until 7:00 p.m. Sunday, October 5, 2025. Meeting dates, 3rd Tuesday of each month, except October and November. Contact office for October and November dates.

Memberships for the Current Year can be obtained at the Administration Building of the Society, Fairgrounds, Lancaster, Ohio, Monday through Friday, 8:30 a.m. - 4:00 p.m.

Quotation. "Regulation No. 901:05-02 Ohio State Department of Agriculture. Each society shall; 1. Issue each membership certificate in the name of the individual who paid the required annual membership fee; 2. Permit only those persons who paid the required annual membership fee and whose signatures appear upon their membership certificates to: (a) Vote at the annual election of directors of the society; (b) Hold any office of the society. 3. Gate admission will be charged starting Monday, October 6, 2025 and continue for the duration of the Fair. Gates will be controlled until 11:00 p.m., October 11, 2025.

NOTICE

No person shall be permitted to make solicitations of any nature on the fairgrounds except in contracted concession or commercial rented spaces.

No person will be permitted to post or display signs, distribute handbills or advertising material or sell or distribute free, any merchandise, except persons under contract.

2025 FAIRFIELD COUNTY FAIR CAMPING COMMITTEE

All current camp spot holders, anyone on the current waiting list or any applicants wanting a camp spot must complete an application and submit it to the Fair Administration Building to be considered for a slot for the 2026 Fair. The applicant must submit the application in person with a photo ID by 7:00 pm on the last day of the fair.

The rental fee for all spots is \$400.

Rental of a camper space for the fair includes up to sixteen days. The camping period for the fair begins as early as September 27th, 2025 (two Saturdays before the start of the fair) through October 12th, 2025 (Sunday immediately following the fair).

Camper Rules:

- Campers/RV's must fit within their LOT BOUNDARIES. Your camper/ RV includes the bumper and anything attached to it and the hitch. If your camper does not fit within the lot lines that will be marked, you will be removed from the spot and you will forfeit your spot.
- 2. Camper parking permit cards must be picked up before your camper is placed and must be displayed in the front window.
- Camper site agreements are not transferable to anyone other than a surviving spouse, if death occurs.
- 4. No subleasing of a camping spot is permitted. Anyone caught subleasing will forfeit the camping spot.
- 5. Camping spots may not be used to park anything other than a camper/RV.
- 6. No vehicles (cars, trucks, golf carts, etc.) are allowed to park within the designated driveways.
- Authorized RV's & Campers shall only be permitted to park in designated camping areas the week before and the week of the Fairfield County Fair. Violator's camper/vehicle will be removed from the fair grounds.
- 8. Electric hookups are to be made using only approved heavy-duty extension cords with appropriate receptacles. There may only be one camper unit per extension cord.
- 9. Awnings are not permitted to be open.
- 10. Quiet time in camping area is midnight.
- 11. At least one adult (18 or over) must stay in each camper at night.
- 12. All premises around camping units are to be kept clean and sanitary. Trash is to be placed in trash containers and dumping of any holding tanks is allowed only at the dumping station.
- 13. Open fires are not permitted. This includes Gas Grills.
- 14. Drinking intoxicating beverages in public view will not be permitted.
- All campers agree to conduct themselves in an acceptable manner and show consideration for all other campers, fair goers and fair staff.
- 16. NO GRAY WATER OR SEWAGE WATER SHALL BE DISCHARGED ON THE GROUND.
- 17. Failure to comply with the above rules will result in forfeiture of all premiums, camping privileges and the removal of the camper from the fairgrounds. The Fairfield County Agricultural Society reserves the right to cancel a lot contract at any time or refuse or ...

reject any application for camping. Campers agree not to hold the Fairfield County Agricultural Society responsible for damage or accidents of any sort. You may add your name to the waiting list for a camping spot by coming into the office. As a camping spot becomes available, the name or names at the top of the list will be contacted to fill the available spot. Individuals on the camp waiting list are responsible for keeping their address and telephone number current. The Fairfield County Agricultural Society will call when a spot becomes available; you will have 24 hours to respond. If the Fairfield County Agricultural Society cannot reach you, they will move on to the next name on the list and you will be removed from the list. Proof of the above rules will apply.

Only the Fair Electrician is to make electrical connections or in any way alter the wiring. A charge will be made for this service.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

- 1. Unless specified in the requirements of the department, all exhibitors will be required to purchase an Exhibitor's Ticket for \$25.00. This coupon ticket will admit one person and car or truck for the duration of the Fair. A firm will be regarded as one exhibitor. The above mentioned tickets will not be sold to the public.
- 2. Entries closing date: September 25, 2025 at 4:00 p.m. Office hours are 8:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. and on September 24 open until 7:00 p.m.
- 3. The Fairfield County Agricultural Society reserves the right to cancel or modify, with or without notice, any or all of the provisions, premiums, or purses specified in this Premium Book, without recourse, if required to do so by strikes, war, weather or other conditions beyond our control. Which would in the opinion of the Board of Directors of The Fairfield County Agricultural Society, justify such action.
- 4. No person or persons shall be allowed to enter the Fairgrounds for the purpose of organized solicitation or promotion, or for the purpose of picketing, disrupting, or disturbing any concessionaire, tenant or lessee of the Fairfield County Agricultural Society or for the purpose of disturbing any exhibitor, employee or officer of the Fairfield County Agricultural Society, or from interfering in any way with any viewer of, or participant in, the activities of the Fairfield County Fair. Any person entering for the purposes herein before mentioned shall be ejected from the premises of the fairgrounds.
- 5. All motorized 2 and 3 wheel vehicles, bicycles, golf carts, all-terrain vehicles and utility vehicles are barred during the authorized Fair period and only official golf carts are permitted.
- 6. All livestock trailers must be removed from the fairgrounds during the week of the fair. The only trailers allowed on the grounds will be those approved by the Senior Fair Board.
- 7. The drinking of intoxicating beverages will not be permitted in public view during the Fair.

- 8. All entries must be made in the name of the bona fide owner, or Breeder's Association of the animal or article or the premium will not be paid.
- 9. All exhibitors of articles entered for premiums must deliver same to their proper department, or leave with the director in charge of the department. THE BOARD WILL NOT BE RESPONSIBLE FOR ANY LOST, STOLEN OR DAMAGED EXHIBITS.
- 10. Persons exhibiting pure bred animals will be required to furnish registration papers for the animals exhibited. This shall apply to swine, sheep, horses and cattle. Registration papers will be checked before judging by a competent person.
- 11. When any director doubts whether the exhibitor is the bona fide owner of the exhibit offered for premium, the exhibitor must file an affidavit identifying himself and state that he is the owner of the exhibit.
- 12. All exhibitors of swine must come prepared to prove the age of their animals by affidavit and comply with inspection and health requirements.
- 13. Exhibitors of livestock are required to keep their stalls open and in good order, and their stock accessible to visitors at all reasonable hours during the fair.
- 14. Only active members in good standings of Fairfield County 4-H Clubs and FFA Chapters are eligible to exhibit at the Fairfield County Fair.
- 15. Check each department for the time the different classes are to be exhibited.
- 16. No person will be allowed to interfere with the judges while exhibits are being judged.
- 17. Only concessions and shows licensed by the **State of Ohio** will be allowed on the grounds. **All operators of concessions must be clean and well groomed. The Fair management will make judgment in this matter (or area).**
- 18. All protests must be made in writing and filed with the Secretary onor befire the last day of the fair.
- 19. No bicycles, motorcycles, automobiles or trucks will be allowed on the promenade grounds between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 10:00 p.m.
- 20. No persons will be allowed to remain on the Fairgrounds during the night except officers of the Fair, adult exhibitors and concessionaires, together with a reasonable number of assistants. NO JUNIOR FAIR EXHIBITOR SHALL REMAIN IN THE BARNS ON THE FAIRGROUNDS DURING THE NIGHT, EXCEPT WITH SPECIAL WRITTEN PERMISSION FROM THE FAIR BOARD OFFICE.
- 21. All departments will be competently judged.
- 22. All persons or organizations desiring to participate in the Fair as commercial exhibitors or as concessionaires must contract for space with the Concession Manager.
- 23. The posting of signs on buildings, trees, counters, fences, etc. will not be permitted, except those contracted by the Agricultural Society.

- 24. No judge is permitted to change an award after premium ribbon has been attached to article
- 25. If there be any question as to the regularity of an entry or the right of an animal or article to compete in the class in age or otherwise, the judge shall report same to the member in charge for adjustment.
- 26. When articles or animals are not deemed worthy, the judge shall refuse to award a premium.
- 27. The right is reserved to return entries in any department, when existing housing facilities are filled. The director in charge is to have full discretion in this matter.
- 28. All Open Class Premium checks will be written the second week following the Fair.
- 29. All 4H and F.F.A members exhibiting at the Fair MUST collect their premiums from the Entry Clerk's office trailer on the north side of the grounds fair week, (FFA livestock and crops only) Monday through Saturday 10 A.M. to 5 P.M. PREMIUMS WILL BE FORFEITED IF NOT COLLECTED ON ABOVE MENTIONED DAYS AND TIME.
- **30.** All Open Class Premium Checks not cashed by December 31st, 2025 will be forfeited to the Agricultural Society.
- **31.** Unless otherwise specified all exhibits must be on display by 9:00 p.m Sunday of Fair week. Exhibits will be released as follows:

BEEF CATTLE: at conclusion of show on Thursday.

DAIRY CATTLE: Lactating Dairy Cows (Both Open Class & Jr.) In County & Out of County Heifers and Cows see page 34 for DATES, TIMES of show and rules. Lactating Dairy Cows (both Open & Jr) have the option to arrive before 9:00 a.m. Tuesday or after 8 p.m. Tuesday evening. All one day lactating show cattle (both in-county and out of county) must be in place on the fairgrounds by 9:00 a.m. Wednesday, with release after show is completed on Wednesday. Arrival time and release time for out-of-county heifers and calves will coincide with out-of-county lactating cows. Arrival time for incounty heifers and calves will be either Sunday before 11:00 a.m. or between 7:30 p.m. and 11:00 p.m. Release time for in-county heifers and calves will be Friday after 8:00 p.m. before Saturday 11:00 a.m. or after 4:30 p.m. Saturday. Check page 34 for additional information on out-of-county cows, heifers and calves.

Out of County SHEEP Open class: can be remove starting Friday at 10:00 P.M. and have to be removed by 9:00 A.M Saturday. (If not removed by 9:00 A.M. they must stay until after 4:30 P.M.

Fairfield County Sheep Open Class: are to be removed after 4:30 P.M. on Saturday. **Machinery and Autos**, 7:30 p.m., **Commercial**, 8:30 p.m. and **Food, Games and Rides**, 11:00 p.m.; **Art Hall commercial exhibitors** after 8:30 p.m. and must use a designated door to remove exhibits. All other **Art Hall** and **Junior Fair Display Barn** exhibits on Sunday, between 11:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m., except **Grange** displays.

32. Any violation of release time forfeits all premium or premiums and debars exhibitor from exhibiting next year, unless special leave is granted by the member in charge of the department.

- 33. The Board of Directors of The Fairfield County Agricultural Society will exercise all possible precautions against outbreaks of fire, theft, accidents or animal diseases; however, they will not assume any responsibility for loss to person or property.
- 34. The Board of Directors have the right to shut down parking around the horse arena during inclement weather.
 - 35. Changing of entries will not be permitted.
- 36. The Board reserves the right to reject any entry for cause and to interpret their own rules.
- 37. Residents of Fairfield County, owners of a membership ticket, have the same right to make entries as exhibitors having an Exhibitor's Ticket.
- 38. Service or Delivery Trucks must purchase a \$10.00 sticker which will admit Truck, Driver and helper for the duration of the Fair.
- 39. No Smoking will be permitted in any building or within 10 feet of an entrance or exit door.
- 40. **NO DOGS OR PETS PERMITTED**, except Service Animals (those trained to assist the disabled) and Junior Fair animals for show or demonstration, during the Fair. All animals must have proof of Rabies vaccination.
 - 41. No Lazer Lights to be sold or allowed on grounds.
- 42. All gates will close fair week, except Broad Street Gate, at 12 midnight and reopen at 7:00 a.m.

PUBLIC RECORDS POLICY

Access to information concerning the conduct of the people's business is a right of every person in this state. Records of the Fairfield County Agricultural Society (FCAS) which are not exempt from disclosure under the law are available for inspection and copying in accordance with the Ohio Public Records Act. Requests for records may be made during regular business hours to: Fairfield County Agricultural Society at 157 East Fair Avenue, Lancaster, Ohio, 43130, 740-653-3041, Attention: Stacey Fisher Fair Manager.

You may view the records you have requested at all reasonable times during the regular business hours of this office. If you wish to view public records of our office, we will promptly make them available to you, if you wish to receive copies of records, we will provide them within a reasonable period of time "prompt" and "reasonable" take into account the volume of records requested, the proximity of the location where the records are stored and the necessity for legal review of the records requested.

Once we have received your request, we will provide our response or acknowledge your request and provide you with an estimate of when you should expect our response, an estimated cost if copies have been requested and the items (if any) that we expect may be exempt from disclosure. If at any time prior to completing our response, we believe our response will take longer than initially estimated (because of volume of records requested, the proximity of location where records are stored; or the complexity of the legal review); we will inform you of this change.

It is within your rights Not To:

Disclose your identity to the FCAS when you request records. You will be given a public records request number which we will use to track our communications with you, and our response(s) to your request.

Provide our office with any written request and,

Provide any reason why you have requested these records.

If any portion of your request for records must be denied because the records are exempt from disclosure under the law, we will inform you which records you have requested are not public by clearly marking the portion "redacted" or we will explain which portions of the record(s) have been redacted. In addition, we will provide you with the legal authority upon which we have relied.

Please make note that if we have denied your request because it is overbroad, ambiguous, or doesn't reasonably identify our records, we will provide you with information about how our records are maintained and if you wish, you may revise your request for the records.

A fee for copies of public records will be charged which covers the cost of duplication incurred by the FCAS; currently this fee is \$.10 per page. In addition, actual cost of postage or other delivery may be charged. We will require payment of these fees prior to processing your request.

IN COMPLIANCE WITH THE TRAFFIC CODE OF THE CITY OF LANCASTER, SECTION 303.12

- 1. PRIVATE PROPERTY USED FOR VEHICULAR TRAFFIC: Nothing in this Traffic Code shall be construed to prevent the owner of real property used by the public for purposes of vehicular travel by permission of the owner and not as a matter of right from prohibiting such use or from requiring additional conditions to those specified in the Lancaster Traffic Code or otherwise regulating such use as may seem best to such owner.
- 2. The speed limit in the Fairfield County Agricultural Society commonly known as the Lancaster Fairgrounds shall not, at any time, exceed fifteen miles per hour.
- 3. Drag racing is prohibited. Drag racing is defined as the operation of two or more vehicles from a point side by side at accelerating speeds in a competitive attempt to outdistance each other or the operation of one or more vehicles over a common selected course, from the same point to the same point, wherein timing is made of the participating vehicles involving competitive accelerations or speeds.
- 4. Persons rendering assistance in any manner to such competitive use of vehicles shall be equally charged as the participants. Agricultural Society Annual Meeting, district meetings and any other Fairfield County Agricultural Society-sponsored or arranged events of any kind.

- 5. SHIFTING CARGO; LOOSE LOADS: No person shall drive, or require or permit any motor vehicle or trailer to be driven, unless such motor vehicle or trailer is constructed or equipped with adequate header boards or similar devices of sufficient strength, load fastening devices and blocking, and unless the load or cargo thereon is properly distributed and securely fastened, braced and blocked, to prevent any portion of the load from penetrating or crushing the driver's compartment or cargo compartment wall, or from falling, spilling or rolling upon the roadway.
- 6. RIGHT OF WAY OF PEDESTRIAN: It shall be the duty of the operator of any vehicle to yield the right of way to a pedestrian lawfully crossing the roadway.

Whenever any vehicle is stopped at a marked crosswalk or at any unmarked crosswalk at an intersection to permit a pedestrian to cross the roadway, the operator of any other vehicle approaching from the rear shall not overtake and pass such stopped vehicle.

7. SOLICITING RIDES; RIDING ON OUTSIDE OF VEHICLE; No person while on a roadway outside a safety zone shall solicit a ride from the driver of any vehicle. No person shall hang onto or ride on the outside of any motor vehicle while it is moving upon a roadway.

No operator shall knowingly permit any person to hang onto or ride on

- 8. GAMES IN STREETS: No person shall fly a kite or play any game of ball or other game on any street or roadway.
- 9. BICYCLE OPERATORS SUBJECT TO VEHICLE OPERATOR PROVISIONS: Every person operating a bicycle upon a roadway shall be subject to the provisions of the Lancaster Traffic Code applicable to the driver of a vehicle, except provisions which by their nature can have no application and except where bicycles are subjected to special regulations.
- 10. TRICK RIDING; HANDS ON GRIPS: No person operating a bicycle, motorbike, or motorcycle upon the roadway shall engage in trick riding or operate such vehicle without both hands upon the handle grips.
- 11. RIDER ATTACHING TO VEHICLE; DUTY OF VEHICLE OPERATOR: A person riding upon a bicycle, motorcycle, coaster, sled, roller skates or toy vehicle shall not attach the same or himself to any vehicle upon the roadway. The operator of a vehicle shall not knowingly permit any person riding upon any bicycle, motorcycle, coaster, roller skates, sled or toy vehicle to attach the same or himself to any vehicle while it is moving upon a roadway.
- 12. CLIMBING; CONTESTS: No person either operating or riding any vehicle, shall engage in a climbing contest or exhibition.

Constitution of The Fairfield County Agricultural Society

ARTICLE I - Title

Section 1. The Society shall be known as the Fairfield County Agricultural Society.

ARTICLE II — Object

Section 1. The object of this Society shall be to promote and encourage agriculture, industry, science, art and educational opportunities for the youth and adults of Fairfield County and to support other activities and interests of Fairfield County, which the board deems proper and in the best interest of the community. It is also the purpose of the Fairfield County Agricultural Society to serve and benefit the citizens of Fairfield County, the surrounding counties, and the State of Ohio, by planning, organizing and operating the Fairfield County Fair, as well carrying out the other purpose stated herein, all of which serve the vital industry of agriculture in Ohio.

ARTICLE III — Membership

Section 1. Any resident of Fairfield County aged 19 years or older, may become a member of this Society by paying annually the membership fee fixed by the Board of Directors.

Section 2. No person shall pay for or secure more than one such membership and that membership shall be for themself. No membership shall be issued to corporations, organizations, partnerships, or firms.

Section 3. Annual memberships dated January 1st through December 31st. Membership tickets will be on sale at the Administration Building on the Fairgrounds from the 1st of December of the previous year until 7:00 p.m. Sunday of the annual fair.

ARTICLE IV — Board of Directors

Section 1. The Board of Directors of the Fairfield County Agricultural Society shall consist of sixteen members; one director elected from each township in Fairfield County, (the city of Lancaster to have the same representation as a Township, two directors from said the County at large. All candidates for members of the Board must be members of the Fairfield County Agricultural Society.

Section 2. The Directors shall be elected for a term of three years and so arranged that one-third of the members be elected each year.

ARTICLE V — Elections

Section 1. Members of the Fairfield County Agricultural Society must declare candidacy for the office of director by filing with the Secretary of the Fairfield County Agricultural Society a petition signed by ten or more members of the Society who are residents of Fairfield County at least seven days before the annual election of Directors is to be held.

Section 2. The annual election of the Board of Directors shall be held in the place designated by the Secretary of the fairgrounds on the last Saturday in October each year. The election will be a minimum of four hours at a time to be determined.

Section 3. The said election shall be by ballot.

Section 4. Only members of Fairfield County Agricultural Society whose memberships are valid may vote at the annual election.

Section 5. The term of office of the retiring Director shall expire and that of the Director-Elect shall begin when the Director-Elect is elected and sworn in at the annual meeting on the first Saturday in November.

ARTICLE VI - Annual Meeting of Memberships

Section 1. The annual meeting of the members of the Society shall be held the first Saturday in November each year at 10:00 A.M. in a site determined by the Secretary of the Society.

ARTICLE VII - Organization and Meeting

Section 1. The Board of Directors shall meet in regular session following the annual meeting on the first Saturday in November of each year and elect a President, Vice-President, Second Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer who will serve one year, as the Board may determine, and until their successors are elected and qualified.

Section 2. The President and Vice-Presidents shall be Directors. The Secretary and Treasurer may or may not be Directors.

Section 3. Before election of officers, the newly-elected Directors shall qualify by taking the oath or affirmation before a competent authority (designated by law).

"I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support the Constitution of the United States, the Constitution of the State of Ohio, laws of Ohio, and the rules and regulations of the Department of Agriculture of Ohio pertaining to agricultural societies, and to the best of my ability perform the duties of Director of the Fairfield County Agricultural Society."

Section 4. The Executive Committee shall appoint the department heads and committees for the following year and announce them at the regular December Board meeting.

ARTICLE VIII — Amendments

Section 1. Amendments to the constitution and by-laws may be proposed by:

- A majority of the Board of Directors at a scheduled meeting voting in favor of placing an amendment on the ballot, or
- Filing a petition with the Secretary of Society at least 30 days to the annual meeting of the membership of the society. Said petition must set forth the proposed amendment and signed by not less than 25 members.

Section 2. If an amendment is proposed, it shall be submitted to the membership of the Society at the annual meeting of the Society. Said amendment(s shall be published in at least one newspaper of general circulation in Fairfield County, and or mailed to the membership, no less than 5 but not more than 10 days before it is to be voted on.

Section 3. When more than one amendment shall be submitted at the same time, they shall be submitted as to enable the members to vote on each amendment separately.

Section 4. If the majority of the membership voting on the proposed amendment shall adopt such an amendment, it shall become part of the constitution or by-laws as intended.

ARTICLE IX — Compensation

Section 1. The Board, in accordance with the rules of the Ohio Departement of Agriculture, shall fix the compensation of Board members.

ARTICLE X — Fair Dates and Duties of Board

Section 1. The Board of Directors shall fix the dates of the annual exposition of the Society, subject to the approval of the Ohio Department of Agriculture.

ARTICLE XI - Severability

Section 1. If any provision of this Constitution is found to be in violation of the laws of the State of Ohio or the rules of the Ohio State Department of Agriculture pertaining to the operation of county agricultural societies, then such provisions shall not be deemed valid, but all other provisions shall continue in full force and effect.

ARTICLE XII - Removal of a Director

Removal of Director for Cause: A director may be removed for cause by the affirmative vote of two-thirds (2/3) of the board of directors. For the purpose of this provision "for cause" shall include the following:

- (a) Absence from any three (3) consecutive meetings of the board within one (1) fiscal year without sufficient excuse or cause;
- (b) Conviction of a felony offense;
- (c) Conviction of any theft offense;
- (d) Conviction of any other criminal offense involving moral turpitude;
- (e) Material violation of the fair board's conflict of interest policy or code of conduct, or
- (f) Engaging in specific actions which cause or tend to cause the organization damage to its property or reputation or which create potential liability on the part of the organization.

(Removal of a Director continued)

The director against whom removal is considered shall be given notice of the basis for his or her possible removal and shall be given the opportunity to present matters in defense or mitigation at the removal hearing. The board shall adopt rules for the hearing which, in its discretion, serve the interest of fairness and interest of the organization generally.

The director against whom removal is considered shall have the right to be represented by counsel. The director against whom removal is considered shall not be entitled to vote on the issue of removal. If a director is removed from the board, he or she will not be eligible to run for the board of directors again in the future. If a director is removed, the directors may then vote to appoint a director from the same location of representation to fill the vacancy until the next annual election.

By - Laws of The Fairfield County Agricultural Society

ARTICLE I - Title

Section 1. Originally approved on February 1, 1868 and amended by the Membership of the Society on November 7, 1998, November 3rd, 2018 and again on November 4, 2023 in compliance with the New Rules of the Ohio Department of Agriculture effective May, 2023.

ARTICLE II - Object

Section 1. The Society will maintain relationships with agricultural associations and education groups such as but not limited to: Farm Bureau, Grange, Ohio State University Extension, 4-H Clubs and FFA chapters, Fairfield County affiliated Boy Scouts of America and Girl Scouts of America. The Society will also encourage local floral and horticulture clubs and local businesses associated with agriculture to participate in the annual fair.

ARTICLE III - Membership

Section 1. Memberships will be on sale for at least twenty hours each week at a place specified by the Society. Notice of days, hours, and places where memberships can be purchases shall be announced in the annual premium list and on the fair website and electronic board twice during the period of sale. Notice will be given once when memberships go on sale and again no sooner than twenty-one days and no less than seven days before sale is terminated. Notice is required to be published in the local newspaper.

Section 2. Only those persons whose names appear on the memberships certificate shall be considered members of the Fairfield County Agricultural Society and have a right to vote at the annual meeting.

ARTICLE IV - Board of Directors

Section 1. Any vacancy caused by death, resignation, removal from office, or other casues may be filled by the Board of Directors until next annual election when a Director shall be elected to fill the unexpired term. The open position will be posted on the website and announced by a letter to eligible members who live within the area to be represented within 30 days. Interested applicants must submit a letter of interest and attend the next Board meeting for an opportunity to do a presentation on their interest and qualifications. The Board must vote on a replacement by the second regularly scheduled board meeting after opening is determined. Said appointments shall be by a majority vote of the Board of Directors at a regular meeting where a quorum is in attendence.

Section 2. Any Director who is absent from three consecutive regular meetings, or who fails to meet required obligations, or who openly and actively works in any manner detrimental to the best interest of the Society may have his or her office declared vacant by a majority vote of the Board of Directors.

Section 3. Any Director serving on the board must have completed two years of membership in the Fairfield County Agricultural Society prior to election to the board. They must have served on the Board for two years prior to being elected to an office.

Section 4. Board of members newly elected in their new term shall submit to a FBI/BCI background check within 30 days of election to be paid for by the Fairfield County Agricultural Society.

ARTICLE V - Election

Section 1. Members wishing to file for a Directorship will be furnished a blank petition and given access to the correct membership list by the Secretary of the Society. The membership list shall be on file at the office of the Society and available upon request of any member of the Society within 2 days from the last day of sale of membership.

Section 2. The Secretary of the Society shall give notice of the election, for three weeks prior to the holding thereof, in a newspaper of general circulation in the county of a provided in section 1711.02 of the Ohio Revised Code, or by letter mailed to each member of the Society.

Section 3. The Secretary of the Society must send the name and address of each member of its board to the Director of Agriculture within 10 days after the election.

Section 4. The president must appoint three judges and two clerks. The election judges and clerks shall remain impartial and avoid an conflicts of interest while conducting and declaring the results of the election of directors. The officials may be members of the Society. The election judges and clerks must not be candidates of the election.

Section 5. Candidates may witness the count either personally or by proxy.

Section 6. Ballots must be marked in pen with a "X" opposite the name of each candidate voted for. If there are any amendments the yes or no vote must be marked in pen with an "X" as well; otherwise, the vote shall not be counted.

Section 7. The Fairfield County Agricultural Society must follow all laws as listed in ORC 901-5-04 (declaration of candidacy for society directors and ORC 901-5-05 (terms of office for society directors and officers and conduct of election).

ARTICLE VI - Annual Meeting!

Section 1. At this meeting, the Officers and Directors of the Society must make reports to the Society concerning the past fair and make recommendations for the betterment of future fairs.

Section 2. The membership shall be given the opportunity to make suggestions and recommendations for the improvement of the Society and its fair. Such other business may be presented and may be prescribed by this constitution or by the Board of Directors may deem as proper.

ARTICLE VII - Organization and Meeting

Section 1. For the purpose of transaction of business, a majority of the Board shall constitute a quorum.

Section 2. It is the duty of the President to preside at all meetings of the Board of Society, using Robert's Rules of Order using authority that is in the best interest of the Society. The President does not have power to make decisions for the Society without meeting with the Executive Committee and approval of the Board of Directors.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the First Vice-President to assume all the duties of the President in the absence of or vacancy of the office of President, serve on the executive committee and will be involved in decisions necessary for the success of the Fair.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Second Vice-President to assume all the duties of the President in the absence of or vacancy of the office of President or First Vice-President, serve on the executive committee and will be involved in decisions necessary for the success of the Fair.

Section 5. In the absence of the President, First Vice-President and Second Vice-President or if a vacancy occurs the Board of Directors can elect a chair to preside over the deliberation of the Board and Society.

Section 6. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep a list of all members of the Fairfield County Agricultural Society, collect monies from all sources and submit a detailed report along with monies to the Treasurer on a daily basis. The Secretary will record all minutes of the Board and Society meetings and publish the minutes of each meeting. The Secretary will report to the Board of Directors a summary of activities at each regular board meeting along with minutes. The Secretary must be bonded in such amount as the Board of Directors may determine. Other duties may be assigned by the Board of Directors.

Section 7. The Treasurer must collect and keep all the funds and revenues of the Society that may accrue during term of office and periodically report same to the Secretary as collected; to pay no money from the treasury of the Society unless approved by the Finance and Auditing Committee or so ordered by the Board of Directors at its annual organization meeting and to perform such duties as required by law or regulations of the Department of Agriculture or assigned by the Board of Directors. The Treasurer must be bonded in such amount as the Board of Directors may determine. Other duties may be assigned by the Board of Directors.

Section 8. Officers of the Board must be elected the first meeting of the year following the annual meeting on the first Saturday of November.

Section 9. President must serve no more than two consecutive terms in the leadership position.

Section 10. The order of business for each meeting shall be Roll Call, Public Participation, Reading and Approval of Adaption of Minutes, Treasurer's Report, Committee Reports, Officer Reports, Unfinished Business, New Business and Adjournment.

Section 11. Notice of special meetings of the Board of Directors shall be sent to each Director by mail, e-mail, or telephone at least five days before the meeting. Notice needs not specify the purpose of the meeting.

Section 12. The Executive Committee shall be the President, Vice-President, Second Vice-President, Past President, Treasurer and Secretary shall serve as the Executive Committee to act on behalf of the board between meetings with power to discharge the duties of the Board of Directors, but not incur debts to take action that conflicts with actions taken by the Board of Directors. This group will report to the Board of Directors at the next regular meeting.

Section 13. The President can appoint temporary committees as needed for the Society to report back with information only. The standing committees are to be appointed by the Executive Committee for the year.

Section 14. Finance and Auditing Committee - the Executive Committee will appoint three Directors as members of the Finance and Auditing Committee. It shall be the duty of the Finance and Auditing Committee to periodically inspect and audit the accounts and books of the Secretary and Treasurer and to report its findings to the Board of Directors. Said committee shall abstract from the Treasuer's report showing the Society's receipts and expenditures to be published annually in a newspaper of the County and to submit to the Director of Agriculture a synopsis of awards as prescribed in Section 1711.05, Ohio Revised Code.

Section 15. Grounds Committee - The Executive Committee will appoint no less than three Directors as members of the Grounds Committee. It shall be the duty of the Grounds Committee to periodically inspect the buildings and grounds of the Society and to report its findings to the board and to perform such duties as may be assigned to the Board. Inspections and findings shall in be cooperation with the grounds superintendent.

Section 16. Fair Manager - the Board of Directors may annually provide by resolution for the creation of position Fair Manager. The Board of Directors will elect the Fair Manager and that person may or may not be a Director of the Board and must be a member of the Fairfield County Agricultural Society. The Fair Manager will report to the Board of Directors at each monthly meeting of all activity. Fair Manager may not enter into contracts without prior Board of Directors' approval.

Section 17. The Board of Directors will be governed in addition by the Directors Handbook annual approved by the Board.

ARTICLE VIII - Compensation

Section 1. Directors - No Director hereof, shall be employed or compensated by the Society for any services rendered except that the Board of Directors may provide by resolution for compensation Directors as follow:

- A. An amount not exceeding \$25.00 plus reimbursement on a per mile basis from the Director's residence to the meeting place of the Board of Directors and return for attending up to twelve meetings of said Board each calendar year. The reimbursement per mile shall not exceed the amount received by Ohio Department of Agriculture employees while driving their own vehicles on official business.
- B. The actual and necessary expenses of any Director, and duly authorized representative of the Board attend State Covention of Agricultural Societies, the annual meeting required by Section 901.06, Ohio Revised Code, and any other event designated as being directly beneficial to the Society and authorized by the Board;
- C. For meals purchased during the week of the Society's fair by Directors and Officers of the society, judges and spouses of Directors
- D. The Society will pay no funds for the individual benefit of any Director, Officer, or any other person as a share, gift, or dividend
- E. Payment for services or labor during the annual fair unless prior approval.
- F. Director shall review and sign approved conflict of interest policy yearly

ARTICLE IX - Fair Dates & Duties of the Board of Directors

In addition to those duties heretofore provided, the Board of Directors shall have the following powers and duties:

Section 1. Approval of Contracts - The Board shall approve all contracts before said contracts shall become binding upon the Society.

Section 2. Employees - The Board shall employ, prescribe the duties of, fix the compensation of and terminate the employment of all employees of the Society.

Section 3. Rules and Regulations - The Board shall have the authority to make all rules and regulations deemed necessary to govern the affairs of the Society.

Section 4. Premium List, Publication, Approval - The Board shall have the power to establish and amend the premium list of the betterment of the Society and shall cause a list of such premium to be published at least sixty days before the opening date of the annual fair. Said published list of premiums shall include the rules and regulations governing exhibitors and the Constitution and By-Laws of the Society.

Section 5. Date of Fair - The Board shall designate at its reorganization meeting the dates of the annual fair for the succeeding calendar year.

ARTICLE X - Severability

Section 1. The laws of the State of Ohio and the rules of the Ohio Department of Agriculture pertaining to the operation of county agricultural societies will be review upon release and annually by the Executive Committee and the Fair Manager to ensure the Society is in compliance with any changes in law or rules enacted by the Ohio Department of Agriculture.

INSPECTION AND HEALTH REQUIREMENTS OF LIVESTOCK EXHIBITED IN OHIO

OUR FAIR WILL OPERATE UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF OHIO'S LIVESTOCK SHOW REFORM ACT AND UNDER ALL APPLICABLE OHIO DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE ADMINISTRATIVE CODE RULES.

"CHAPTER 901-19 OF THE ADMINISTRATIVE CODE (OHIO'S LIVESTOCK TAMPERING EXHIBITION RULES) WILL BE MADE AVAILABLE TO A LIVESTOCK EXHIBITOR OR AN ADULT ADVISOR UPON REQUEST."

PREVIOUS COPIES OF THESE RULES ARE NO LONGER EFFECTIVE.

901:1-18-01 CHAPTER'S APPLICATION

- (A) Animals when moved or imported into Ohio solely for exhibition purposes shall comply with the requirements of this chapter.
- (B) Animals imported into Ohio for any purpose in addition to exhibition purposes shall meet all movement and import requirements of Chapter 901:1-17 of the Administrative Code.

901:1-18-02 DEFINITIONS (as used in this chapter)

- (A) "Official Veterinarian" means any licensed and accredited veterinarian approved by the Ohio Department of Agriculture, or an employee of the Ohio Department of Agriculture or the United States Department of Agriculture, Animal Plant Health Inspection Service, Veterinary Services.
- (B) "Certificate of Veterinary Inspection" means the same as an interstate certificate of veterinary inspection as defined in 9 C.F.R. 86.1.
- (C) "Contagious or infectious disease" means any disease, including any foreign animal disease, or vector, capable of transmission by any means from a carrier animal to a human or to another animal and includes dangerously contagious or infectious diseases.
- (D) "Department" means the Ohio Department of Agriculture or its designee.
- (E) "Exhibition" means the same as defined in section 901.70 of the Revised Code.
- (F) "Licensed or accredited veterinarian" means a person who is licensed by the state of Ohio to practice veterinary medicine and who is certified by the United States Department of Agriculture, animal plant health inspection service, veterinary services, to be an accredited veterinarian.
- (G) 'Residue' means any poisonous or deleterious pesticide governed by 40 C.F.R. 180, any poisonous or deleterious substance governed by 21 C.F.R. 109.6, or any other substance governed by 21 C.F.R. 556.

901:1-18-03 EXHIBITIONS: SANITATION, INSPECTION AND RECORDS

(A) Each entity sponsoring an exhibition shall have in attendance an official veterinarian for the duration of the exhibit.

- (B) Each entity sponsoring an exhibition shall:
 - (1) Under the direction of the official veterinarian, thoroughly clean and disinfect each building, pen, stall, ring or other enclosure in which animals are to be quartered for exhibition immediately prior to exhibition;
 - (2) Have the official veterinarian:
 - (a) Examine the certificate of veterinary inspection when required for an animal brought to the exhibition;
 - (b) Inspect within a reasonable time of arrival each animal brought to the exhibit for any clinical signs of any infectious or contagious diseases;
 - (c) Inspect each animal daily that is present at the exhibition for symptoms of infectious or contagious disease.
 - (3) Maintain a record for one year from the date of the exhibition of each animal present at the exhibit. The record shall contain the name and address of the owner of each animal, the species, official identification (if applicable), and breed of the animal.
 - (4) Order the immediate removal of any animal which, in the opinion of the official veterinarian, places other animals at unacceptable risk of any infectious or contagious disease.
- (C) The department may grant an exemption from paragraph (A) and (B) (1) of this rule upon request and for good reason.

901:1-18-04 EXHIBITORS

An exhibitor, owner, or bailee shall

- (A) Not present for exhibition or exhibit livestock which exhibitor, owner, or bailee knows or has reason to suspect is affected with or has been exposed to a dangerously contagious or infectious disease or residue.
- (B) Immediately remove livestock with any clinical signs of an infectious or contagious disease from the exhibition premises when directed by an exhibition official, the official veterinarian, or the department.
- (C) Present a certificate of veterinary inspection, registration certificates, vaccination certificate, or other documents to exhibition officials, the official veterinarian or the Department upon request.
- (D) Failure o comply with the rules of this chapter may result in the department taking action pursuant to section 941.10 of the Revised Code or issuing a quarantine order until such time that the violation has been remedied.

901:1-18-05 POULTRY AND FOWL

- (A) All turkeys, chickens and gamebirds exhibited in Ohio must either:
 - (1) Originate directly from a flock or hatchery which is a participant in the National Poultry Improvement Plan (NPIP) for the Eradication of Disease and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph;
 - (2) Originate directly from a flock which has had a negative test for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease within twelve months preceding the opening date of exhibition and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph:
 - (3) Have had a negative test for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease upon arrival, within ninety days, preceding the opening date of the exhibition and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirements of this paragraph;
 - (4) Be tested for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease upon arrival at the exhibition by a tester approved by the Ohio Department of Agriculture and found negative.

(B) Any co-mingling of birds voids national poultry improvement plan

status from the original flock or hatchery.

(C) The rapid whole blood test shall not be used to test turkeys for compliance with the requirements of paragraphs (A)(2), (A)(3) and (A) (4) of this rule.

(D) Waterfowl, doves and pigeons are exempt from this rule.

901:1-18-06 CATTLE




- **1.** Mt. Zion United Brethren Church (Huddle Church) was built in 1858. Moved and rebuilt on the Fairgrounds in 1990.
- 2. The Art Hall was constructed in 1909. The combined area covered by this one roof, totals 22,000 square feet. The Agriculture and Horticulture Departments, school exhibits and Commercial exhibits are included in this hall.
- **3.** Replica of 1930 Gasoline Station. Built in 1979 and donated by Lancaster Old Car Club.
- **4.** Original Floral Hall–built prior to 1860.
- **5.** The Pioneer Cabin-1803. Originally located just outside the city on Pleasantville Road, this structure was moved to the Fairgrounds in 1953. The interior features many splendid examples of pioneer furniture, tools and utensils, some of which are quite rare.
- **6.** The old Carroll, Ohio, Hocking Valley C & O Depot 1871-1966. Preserved on the Fairgrounds for historical purposes.
- **7.** Round Cattle Barn-1906. Designed and built by J. E. Hedges.
- **8.** The Dr. John V. Brison and son, Henry, Doctor's Office, Millersport, Ohio Built mid 1850's. Moved to the Fairgrounds in 1985.
- **9.** The Joe Arnold Store, Dumontville, Ohio–Founded about 1885 by Emanuel Miller, sold to Joe Arnold in 1904. Moved and erected on the Fairgrounds in 1969.
- **10.** The Dining Hall was originally a residence. It was remodeled and enlarged in 1882 to be used as a Dining Hall for the fair. The building is still being used to serve food to fair visitors.
- **11.** The Weakley, No. 6, Liberty Township School House Built about 1870 Moved and re-built on the Fairgrounds in 1976.






